

WALK DETAILS 5.25m/8.45km Shorter Route 4.25m/6.8km Both distances include the paths round the ponds.

GRADE: Easy With gates and steps.

SUMMARY

This walk through the villages of Rawcliffe and Rawcliffe Bridge explores the industrial heritage of the area whilst enjoying views of Rawcliffe & Thorne Moors and Sugar Mill Ponds Nature Reserve. The Sugar Mill Ponds site is fully accessible to wheelchairs.

FEATURES OF INTEREST POINT 1

SUGAR MILL PONDS
Take time to look at the various notice boards around the site.
The HERITAGE BOARD will help you to understand the history of this beautiful nature

POINT 1-2

As you walk along the canal bank look away to your half-right towards the distant trees and to Rawcliffe & Thorne Moors.



POINT 2

As you climb on to the road, look to your right towards the river bridge. The River Don or the 'Dutch River' was diverted to come this way in 1635, so called because the man who built it was Dutchman Cornelius Vermuyden.

POINT 2-3

Just before you turn right, look straight ahead on Bridge Lane. The Victorian school (1877) and Wesleyan Chapel (1906) are situated just a short walk along on the right hand side.

CRODA INTERNATIONAL

This is where the Croda company was born in 1925. The company eventually expanded to become Croda International plc, with a working staff of about 3,400 spread around the world covering at least 34 countries (2012). Their Head Office is at Cowick Hall. See the HERITAGE BOARD at Sugar Mill Ponds for more information.

POINT 3

CEPA (2016)

This site has had a long association with the paper making industry, going way back to 1889. The chequered history of the site is covered on the HERITAGE BOARD.

POINT 4-5

In September 1975, peace came to Rawcliffe, East Cowick & Snaith with the opening of an eight and a half mile stretch of the M62 motorway, relieving the villages of heavy traffic.

POINT 8-9

THE LOCAL RAILWAY
The line was officially opened on
29th March 1848.
It's story is on the HERITAGE
BOARD at Sugar Mill Ponds.

POINT 9

THE RAILWAY STATION
Situated just a short walk to your left.
