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People living in the East Riding are less likely to be the victim of crime than people living in other areas served by Humberside Police. Although there has been an overall increase in crime, it is important to put the data in context and highlight that the primary reason for the overall increase is the rise in offences under the category 'Violence against the person'. This is due to the increase in stalking and harassment offences that we now record under National Crime Recording Standards (NCRS). Many of these offences are committed online, involving people who already know each other, and previously would have been dealt with without the need to record a criminal offence.

To put this into context, there were 20,979 offences committed in the East Riding of Yorkshire last year which equates to less than 0.062 crimes per person. Although this an increase of 15% compared to 2017, it is still a relatively low figure compared with other areas especially considering that the East Riding has 333 settlements and four major settlements: Beverley, Bridlington, Goole and the Haltemprice area to the west of Hull. By comparison last year, 40,792 crimes were committed in Hull, 20,350 in North East Lincolnshire and 19,758 in Grimsby. So, in Hull and Grimsby there are over twice the number of crimes committed per person compared to East Yorkshire.

2. Crime issues of particular note

The following list shows some of the crimes that have occurred in the previous month in your area.

3. Community Priorities

The Neighbourhood Policing Team meet regularly with partners to ensure we have a multi-agency approach to local issues, individuals and problem solving. These meetings are regularly attended by partners including Humberside Fire and Rescue Service, Youth and Family Support, Housing Officers, Environmental Health and the East Riding Anti-Social Behaviour Team. We share information and resources to deal with local neighbourhood issues, in particular, those identified as causing the most harm in the community.

1. Issue: Youths Causing Annoyance in Market Place Snaith

Officers will be patrolling in the above areas due to reports of youths congregating and causing a nuisance along with issues of littering and general Anti-Social Behaviour. Anyone caught engaging in such activities will be dealt with jointly with the East Riding of Yorkshire Council.

2. Ferry Lane Snaith

There have been reports of youths on motorbikes on Ferry lane Snaith. Allegedly the riders are speeding, generally causing a nuisance and riding without helmets. We will be patrolling and taking action when necessary. Another group also locate the area and congregate under the bridge. There have been reports about littering and graffiti. All offenders will be dealt with and their details passed onto the council.

3. Snaith Station Car Park.

Now the nights are darker another area of concern from the community is the station car park on George Street Snaith. We often get reports of 'boy racers' congregating and causing harassment, alarm and distress. We will enforce where necessary by issuing section 59 warnings. The warning will give us the power to seize the vehicle if the driver has previously been warned in the last 12 months and continue being a nuisance.

4. Priory Way Snaith

There has been a report of graffiti along the snicket from The Priory Church up behind Priory Way towards the high school. We are in the process of trying to identify who the offenders are and will be patrolling the area on an evening. Please can you pass on any information to us that may assist us in our enquiries? If anyone recognises the graffiti in the photographs and can name the offenders then please pass on this information to us




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4. Crime Reduction Advice

Protect your mobile phone



Your mobile is so much more than a phone. It's your phone book, internet, email, social media, maps, personal banker, camera, photo library and weather forecaster. That's why we strongly advise you to read on, to see how you can prevent yourself from being a victim of mobile theft.

- Don't leave your phone, iPad, tablet or camera unattended, out of your sight or left on a table – thieves can grab a phone in seconds.
 - Always be aware of your mobile and your whereabouts and act accordingly and when you've finished using it, put it away.
 - Ensure you retain a record of your phone's IMEI number. This is a 15-digit unique number which can be obtained by keying in ***#06#**, you need this information if the phone is lost or stolen (don't keep a note of it on your phone as it defeats the object.).
 - Use your device's security features, apps or PIN locking mechanisms to protect your data and prevent the phone being used if stolen.
 - Register for free on an accredited mobile phone database such as Immobilise. (This helps police to identify you as the rightful owner and it can also be used to register details of other items, eg bicycles, laptops, cameras etc.)
 - Track it - consider installing a tracker app on your smartphone. They're readily available online. If your mobile's ever stolen, act promptly.
- If you have your phone on a contract and lose your phone or have it stolen you need to report it to your mobile phone provider immediately as the network provider can usually block the phone and render it useless even if a new sim card is used.

Vehicle seized for having No Insurance



On Sunday 6th January 2019, a Roads Policing officer was patrolling Snaith and the surrounding area. During this patrol, the officer spotted a Transit Van which was insecurely loaded with scrap metal. The officer stopped the vehicle on the A1041 as it was heading into Snaith.

Checks revealed that the vehicle was uninsured and that the driver had no licence. As a result, the driver was reported for the offences of driving whilst uninsured and driving otherwise than in accordance with a licence. For these offences combined, the driver will receive a fine, points on his licence and is likely to be disqualified from driving as a result.

Three males suspected to be involved in Hare Coursing

On Sunday 13th January 2019, local officers located a vehicle which was allegedly being used by three males to commit Hare Coursing offences in the Rawcliffe Bridge and White City areas. Checks on the vehicle revealed that it was uninsured and it was seized for no insurance under Section 165 of the Road Traffic Act 1988.

The three male occupants were all reported for the alleged offences committed, and were issued Section 35 dispersal notices preventing them from returning to the East Riding of Yorkshire for the next 24hrs. They will now also have to make their own way home, a not insignificant distance. They were also sent Fairway letters formally warning them of their behaviour. If they choose to ignore these and re-offend these will be used as evidence to a Criminal Behaviour Order which will make a breach arrestable.



Hare-coursing causes enormous stress and worry for farmers and rural dwellers in the county, as well as the animals involved. It's been around for 300 years but was made illegal under the Hunting Act of 2004, and involves flushing out hares from recently-harvested fields, then setting lurchers or greyhound dogs onto them. It has turned into an illegal betting activity that sees huge sums of money change hands, and often involves untaxed/uninsured vehicles with a number of occupants coming into the East Riding from other areas of the country. Hare coursing ruins farmland as dogs run across recently-planted fields, and their owners drive across in heavy vehicles. To gain access, they often break through fences and locked gates.

APPEAL – Burglary at a farm on Balk Lane, Pollington

Officers are investigating reports of a burglary at a farm on Balk Lane, Pollington near Goole overnight between Tuesday 29 January and Wednesday 30 January.

It was reported that someone broke into a building on the farm and stole diesel and veterinary medication. The drug stolen is NOT designed for human consumption and can be lethal if a large enough dose is ingested or injected. If any bottles or syringes containing the drug are found, please telephone 101 to have them safely recovered by officers.

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Safer Roads Humber on A1041

On Sunday 3rd January 2019, Safer Roads Humber deployed their mobile safety cameravan on the A1041 in East Cowick. This particular location is a 30mph speed limit and statistics published on the Safer Roads Humber website show that an average of 2,112 vehicles (or 60% of total traffic) exceeded the speed limit each day between 2015 and 2017. Statistics also show that there were three collisions at this location resulting in an injury between 2015 and 2017.

All of the pre-designated camera location sites are published on the Safer Roads Humber website along with collision, casualty, speed and offence statistics for each area.

Community Speed Watch – Coming to a village near you



Police and Crime Commissioner, Keith Hunter, and Humberside Police Chief Constable, Lee Freeman, have agreed to develop a Community Speed Watch scheme across the force area – including the East Riding. The decision follows a successful pilot earlier this year at a village in North Lincolnshire, followed by visits to similar schemes already operating in other police force areas.

Community Speed Watch allows residents, particularly those in rural communities, to become police-trained volunteers monitoring vehicle speeds in their communities, with the aim of changing the behaviour of some road users who drive above the speed limit through small towns and villages.

Mr Hunter said: "There has always been a persistent problem with drivers speeding in all our towns and villages but particularly in rural areas. Communities tell me time and again how this inconsiderate behaviour blights their lives and how they want to help the police to reduce it.

"I have always said I want more power passed to communities who want to make a positive difference where they live and Community Speed Watch looks to give residents what they have been asking for. We have received numerous requests for a Speed Watch scheme across the force area so I am delighted Humberside Police will now be developing our own in the coming weeks.

A community group in Reedness have plans to establish a Community Speed Watch and require local volunteers who will be trained to operate speed monitoring equipment in approved sites of concern. If you are interested in becoming a volunteer, please contact




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6. Meet your officers
