

WALK DETAILS 8.75m/14km Short walk 7.75m/12.5km

GRADE: Moderate A mixture of road, field side, track and canal side walking. Uses asection of the Trans Pennine Trail.

#### **SUMMARY**

A pleasant walk through rural West Cowick then following the Aire and Calder canal into Pollington before returning to Snaith via Dorr Lane, an ancient green lane.

FEATURES OF INTEREST



# POINT 3 Methodist Church HERITAGE BOARD. POINT 4-5

Mill Lane in West Cowick, so called because of a windmill, demolished in 1928, in the grounds of Mill House. Kiln House in Grange Road is on the site of one of a number of medieval pottery kilns in West Cowick.

#### POINT 5

As you turn into the footpath off Grange Road the small area on your right houses the remains of a former Chapel and burial ground (2016).

# POINT 6-7

After crossing the motorway you go round a small wood, Shearburn Plantation.
The Shearburns were a very prominent family in Snaith throughout the 19th century. They were both major landowners and one of the town's solicitors and built the present Snaith Hall c1829. This area was part of their large estate.

#### POINT 7-8

The point where you leave the canal side is the site of the Balne Croft Swing Bridge over the

canal. When it was constructed the canal cut the link from Balne Croft farm, on the south side, to Pollington, so the swing bridge was built to restore that link. Continuing down Balne Croft Lane you will pass between the remains of the rail bridge which carried a branch of the Hull to Barnsley line.

Reaching the road, from the bridge, you can look along the Aire and Calder Canal to the largest lock on the waterways system or better still take a short RECOMMENDED DIVERSION along the canal and read the HERITAGE BOARD by the lock.

## **POINT 9-10**

Leaving Pollington you will see some buildings on your right which were once part of RAF Snaith, a World War II air base and home of 51 and 150 Squadrons, Bomber Command, which was actually in Pollington. This is where the Women's Auxilliary Air Force (WAAF) personnel were based. After the war the huts were used by Land Army girls.
